Jason Anderson Director of Programming

Jason Anderson is a programmer, writer and lecturer based in Toronto. He's the International Programmer for Short Cuts, the Toronto International Film Festival's annual program of short form cinema. He's also the Director of Programming for the Kingston Canadian Film Festival, the country's largest standalone festival of Canadian movies. He's served on juries for festivals such as Hot Docs, Vienna Independent Shorts, the Tel Aviv International Student Film Festival and Nordisk Panorama. Previously a longtime critic and columnist for Toronto's Eye Weekly and The Grid, he currently writes about film and music for such publications as Uncut, Sight + Sound and Cinema Scope. He teaches film criticism at the University of Toronto. His first novel Showbiz was published by Toronto's ECW Press in 2004. Raised in Calgary, he lives in Toronto with his wife, daughter and too many records.



Diana Cadavid

Diana Cadavid is a Colombian/Canadian curator of film and new media. She's currently International Programmer for the Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF) and the Artistic Director of the Los Angeles Latino International Film Festival (LALIFF) and the Festival Internacional de Cine de Cali (FICCALI).

Diana has also produced and edited the short films "BREATHE THE NIGHT" (20, currently available on HBOMax in the USA), "BLEIBEN" (06), "STILL LIFE WITH ECHO" (08) and "DEFINE SOLIDARITY" (13), directed by Álvaro Girón. She was the Production Manager for the feature film MAÑANA A ESTA HORA (16) by Lina Rodríguez, and is producing A MOTH IN THE FLAME by Mónica Bravo.



Liane Cunje

Liane Cunje is a producer, programmer, and leads acquisitions for Vinegar Syndrome Pictures. Coming from a film studies and TV development background in Montreal, Cunje completed an MA in Producing Film and TV in the UK before working for cult label Arrow Video. A former Festival Programming Manager at TIFF, Programmer with the Overlook FF, Assistant Director for Media City FF, and current Programmer for Aspen Shortsfest, she features on international juries and panels, and is a board member for the Miskatonic Institute of Horror Studies. She recently Associate Produced her first feature, Molly McGlynn's BLOODY HELL, which premiered at SXSW 2023.



Lisa Haller

Lisa Haller has worked in film festival programming and strategy for over 10 years. She is currently the Senior Short Film Programmer at the Whistler Film Festival (Canada). Previously, Lisa worked with the Toronto International Film Festival programming team as the Canadian film manager and programmer for TIFF Short Cuts. She has served on juries and panels for film festivals such as the Atlantic International Film Festival, Cúcalorus Film Festival, Newport Beach Film Festival, Norwegian Short Film Festival, and Toronto International Film Festival. Lisa holds a Master's in Communication and Culture at York University and Toronto Metropolitan University. She lives in Halifax, Nova Scotia with her husband and rambunctious twin toddlers.

Justine Bateman Jury

Filmmaker and author Justine Bateman has an impressive, decades-long resume in film and TV that includes a Golden Globe nomination and two Emmy nominations.

VIOLET, Bateman's directorial feature film debut of her own script, stars Olivia Munn, Luke Bracey, and Justin Theroux. It premiered at the 2021 SXSW Film Festival and the 2021 Toronto International Film Festival. VIOLET was the official selection in six more festivals, and is "Certified Fresh" with an 82% Rotten Tomatoes rating, after receiving rave reviews. At the 2022 Cadet Film Awards, Bateman won Best Breakthrough Filmmaker and was nominated for Best Original Screenplay. IndieWire named Justine one of the "22 Rising Female Filmmakers to Watch in 2022."

Bateman wrote and produced her directorial film short debut, FIVE MINUTES, which premiered at the 2017 Toronto Film Festival and was chosen by seven more festivals, including the 2018 Tribeca Film Festival. It was one of the winners of the 2019 Amazon Prime Video Direct Festival Stars Program and was chosen by both Short of the Week and Vimeo Staff Picks.

Justine has authored two books, both best-sellers. FAME and FACE were published by Akashic Books in 2018 and 2021, respectively. In 2021, she was named one of InStyle's "Badass 50" and chosen as one of Adweek's "Trailblazers." Justine holds a UCLA degree in Computer Science and Digital Media Management.



Opal H. Bennett Jury

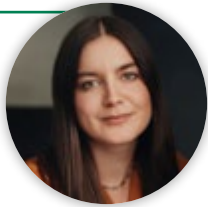
Opal H. Bennett is an Emmy-winning Co-Producer and Shorts Producer at POV. Her first season curating POV SHORTS won the 2020 IDA Award for Best Short Form Series. Previously Opal was Shorts Programmer and Dir. of Artist Development at DOCNYC and Senior Programmer at Athena Film Festival. She has also worked with Nantucket Film Festival, Aspen Shortsfest, and Tribeca Film Festival. She is a Programming Consultant for the March on Washington Film Festival.

Opal is a member of the AMPAS Documentary branch. She has participated on various festival juries and selection committees for film grants. A Columbia Law grad, Opal holds a Masters from the LSE and received her B.A. from NYU.



Kiva Reardon Jury

Kiva Reardon is Vice President, Film at PASTEL, the filmmaking collective founded by Barry Jenkins, Adele Romanski, and Mark Ceryak. Previously, she held the positions of: Associate Director of Film Programs at the Academy Museum and Lead Programmer of Contemporary World Cinema at the Toronto International Film Festival. She has also worked with Hot Docs, the Miami International Film Festival, and the International Film Festival Rotterdam (IFFR). In 2013 she founded cléo journal, a publication dedicated to film and feminism, which ran until 2019. Her writing on film has appeared in multiple magazines, newspapers, and online. She has spoken at institutions around the world and served on numerous international festival juries.



Glenn Kiser Industry

Glenn Kiser is the Director of the Dolby Institute, Dolby's initiative to bring education and inspiration to filmmakers and artists about the creative use of sound and image in storytelling. He is the host of the Dolby Institute Podcast, now in its eighth season, featuring in-depth conversations with artists about how they use technology. He created the Dolby Institute Fellowships, supporting exciting new films from directors including the Daniels, Rebecca Hall, Alma Har'el, Benh Zeitlin, Taika Waititi, Dee Rees, and Reed Morano. Previously, Kiser was the VP & General Manager of Lucasfilm's Skywalker Sound, where he oversaw sound teams on numerous films including AVATAR, THE INCREDIBLES, WALL-E, and the STAR WARS prequels. Before joining Skywalker, Kiser was a post-production executive at Propaganda Films, where he worked with directors including David Fincher, Spike Jonze, and Jane Campion. He is a member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.



Sarah Lash Industry

Sarah Lash is the Senior Director, Acquisitions at Condé Nast Entertainment (CNE), responsible for acquiring premium content for the company's network of digital channels, including Glamour, GQ, The New Yorker, Vanity Fair, and WIRED. Lash started at CNE in 2014 as a consultant, helping to shepherd the acquisition of dozens of short films and series for digital distribution. Prior to joining CNE, Lash was Senior Vice President of Sales and Acquisitions for ATO Pictures where she executive produced the release of TERRI, negotiated deals for all acquisitions, and oversaw ancillary sales. In 2009, Lash produced the No Borders co-production market, organized by the Independent Filmmaker Project (IFP). Prior to that, she was the Head of Domestic Sales for Cinetic Media where she was instrumental in the sales of various titles for the Sundance, Cannes, Tribeca, and Toronto film festivals. Lash has also served as an agent at ICM, as Vice President of Acquisitions and Co-Productions at IFC, and as Director of Acquisitions at Lionsgate. Lash has a BA in English and Philosophy from Colgate University.



Sudeep Sharma Industry

Sudeep is a Programmer for the Sundance Film Festival focusing on documentary feature films. Having started at Sundance in 2008 as a screener of international documentary features for the festival and a reader for the labs, he has previously been an Associate Programmer, Documentaries and Shorts Programmer for the festival. He is also Director of Programming for the Palm Spring International Shortfest where he has programmed since 2014 and served as Interim Artistic Director for the 2022 edition. Sudeep has worked in programming at many festivals including the Indian Film Festival of Los Angeles, Aspen Shortsfest, LA Film Festival, AFI Fest, and was Director of Public Programming for the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Science. He has advised on funding and granting boards and served on numerous film festival juries including at Toronto International Film Festival, San Francisco Film Festival, Dokufest, and others. A native of New Jersey, Sudeep has a Ph.D. in Cinema and Media Studies from UCLA. He has taught film and television history, industry, and criticism courses at universities throughout Southern California.



Jonathan King Industry

Jonathan King is Chief Creative Officer, Narrative at Concordia Studio, an independent film and television company founded in partnership with acclaimed documentary filmmaker Davis Guggenheim, with the support of Laurene Powell Jobs and Emerson Collective.

For Concordia, King most recently produced STILL: A Michael J. Fox movie, directed by Guggenheim and to be released by Apple in May 2023; RITA, the new film from acclaimed Guatemalan filmmaker Jayro Bustamante, and SWAN SONG, directed by Academy Award winner Benjamin Cleary and starring Academy Award winner Mahershala Ali.

Prior to launching Concordia, King was President of Narrative Film and Television at Participant. Over the course of 12 years



at Participant, King built a diverse slate of almost 50 feature films, including STILLWATER directed by Academy Award winner Tom McCarthy and starring Matt Damon, the 2019 Best Picture winner GREEN BOOK, Alfonso Cuarón's multiple Academy Award winning ROMA, 2017 sleeper hit WONDER, the 2016 Best Picture winner SPOTLIGHT, as well as CONTAGION, LINCOLN, BEASTS OF NO NATION, THE HELP, THE BEST EXOTIC MARIAGOLD HOTEL, DEEPWATER HORIZON, and A MOST VIOLENT YEAR. In 2012, he launched Participant's effort into making films in Latin America, which produced Pablo Larrain's prize-winning films NO and NERUDA, and Sebastian Lelio's 2018 Academy Award winner A FANTASTIC WOMAN. King also produced the Emmy Award winning limited television series WHEN THEY SEE US, created and directed by Ava DuVernay.

Throughout his 25 years in the film industry, King has worked as both an independent producer and an executive for companies including Focus Features and Miramax Films. He started his career in MGM's New York office, scouting books, theater, and independent films.

For more than 20 years, Aspen Film has dedicated itself to youth education and outreach. We believe that film is a vibrant artistic expression and powerful communication tool, able to open windows to humanity and build bridges of understanding between cultures. Aspen Film's free school programs seek to expand worldviews, develop critical viewing skills, cultivate curiosity, and inspire creativity.

New this year is the Voices in Film Youth Forum which incorporates a wide variety of youth-focused programming and events during Shortsfest. The forum is an umbrella over key educational programs: Making Movies Matter, Filmmakers to the Classroom, Young Filmmaker Labs, Students to the Festival, and Youth Jury. The week kicks off with a special in-school event at the Aspen District Theatre featuring a selection of this year's festival films. The interactive program is hosted by youth with a filmmaker Q+A following the films. The event is broadcast live so that students and teachers who cannot attend in person may participate remotely. Local and visiting young filmmakers and media studies students have the opportunity to socialize, connect, and watch a compilation of student works during a social mixer at the end of the week. The forum is produced by a youth-driven steering committee with the support and mentorship of Aspen Film's staff.

Aspen FilmEducates provides an immersive dive into the world of filmmaking through our Film Camps giving an opportunity for teens to learn to express themselves through film, as well as to experience what it's like to be part of a creative team. Each participant is involved in every step of the process, from operating the camera, to manning the mic boom to editing the final cut. This year's camps focus on documentary filmmaking and animation. Aspen Film partners with the Colorado Film School to provide experienced educators to teach our camps.

Students and teachers are invited to experience in-depth public panel discussions with filmmakers and invited industry professionals on various topics relating to the art and industry of filmmaking today.

We offer film camps for youth interested in learning the art of filmmaking. Students in a small group setting get hands-on experience with everything from storyboarding to camera operation to post production and editing.

TICKETS FOR TEACHERS

To encourage local educators to identify new films appropriate for their curricula, Aspen Film provides tickets for teachers to attend certain programs at Filmfest and Shortsfest at no charge.

At Shortsfest, visiting filmmakers meet with high school and college-level film students to explore the creative process and offer feedback on students' work.

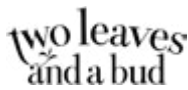
